



The School Crest

Our School Crest (Coat of Arms) is linked with the Cathedral whose Patron Saint is St Boniface. St Boniface, who was born in Devon in England, became the Apostle of Ancient Germany, where he was martyred in 755AD.

The Crest consists of a shield, with a mitre at the top and ears of wheat either side. It is surrounded by a scroll bearing the name of our School with the School Motto 'FIDE ET OPERE' (By Faith and Work) at the base. On the shield, to the left is a ship in full sail to represent the Sea Port town of Bunbury. The ship is also a symbol of the Christian Church. To the top right is an open book to represent learning, and below, a lamb standing for the Lamb of God, our Saviour Jesus Christ. The lamb and the wheat also represent two of the main industries of the State, wheat and sheep. The Bishop's Mitre surmounting the whole reminds us that it is a Church School and under the aegis of the Bishop of the Diocese.

The colour of the Crest is Old Gold on a Blue background. The original design was drawn by Mrs Neroli Roberts of Bunbury in 1971.
