Head of Primary Report to Parents and Friends' Association February 2023

Student Numbers:

Primary numbers sat at 204 students in Primary at this time in 2022, and are currently at 217. Year 4, 5 and 6 are all double streamed.

Staffing:

- Caroline Andrault has a contract for Term 1 to teach French in Primary and Secondary. We are seeking to extend this to cover the remainder of the year.
- Anna Fischer has a fixed term contract and is covering Geoff Dunbar's Long Service Leave in Term 1.
- We await the arrival of our new Chaplain in Semester 2 and, with the departure of Father Geoff Chadwick and Mrs Glynis Biggar, Ms Tran Ngo is teaching Religious Education to the Early Childhood classes in Semester 1, while Primary Classroom teachers are delivering Religious Education.
- With the arrival of several Special Educational Needs students in the Primary School this year, we have appointed a SEN Educational Assistant for Term 1 and are advertising for this position for the remainder of the year.
- Rachel Cook has accepted the role of the Gifted and Talented Co-ordinator in the Primary School, seeking to ensure a smooth transition of these opportunities from Primary into Secondary School.

Parent Teacher meetings for 2023

All Parent Teacher meetings will be held through Microsoft Teams in 2023. We have reviewed our provision of these meetings based on the feedback we received in 2022 and decided to continue with the Teams option. Parents are welcome to make direct contact with any specific teacher if they feel this

is necessary, and to come to school for a face-to face meeting. However, in general we received excellent feedback around the use of Teams for the scheduled PTO meetings, with Parents citing issues around privacy, the ability to join the meeting remotely from anywhere and the efficiency of the system as compelling reasons for continuing.

Grading and RAPS

We have reviewed the provision of an academic grade for Religious and Philosophical Studies in Year 7 to 11. This is not a requirement of the School Curriculum and Standards Authority and is a school-based decision. We have decided to remove the grade on reports, but we will still report ratings on the 'Approach to Learning' which indicates the level of application and engagement a student has shown during the Semester.

Camps

The Year 7 and Year 11 camps happened during the first week of term and both were most successful in meeting their respective objectives.

This is the first time we have run an Aspirations Camp for Year 11 students and we were pleased with the positive responses from our students.

Our Year 10 students will head out on their 10-day Outward Bound Camp in Week 9 of Term 1.

NAPLAN testing Year 3, 5, 7 and 9

As Parents should be aware, the WA Government has brought NAPLAN testing forward for 2023 with our students taking these assessments online during Week 7 and 8 of Term 1. A practice test will be available to students prior to the testing window opening.
